## **Light-Up Events**

Japanese Hypertension Society set up light-up events around the World Hypertension Day 2013. 8 landmarks in 6 areas were lightened with red as a symbol of arterial blood and blue as that of venous blood. In Osaka, an enormous Ferris wheel in Tempozan turned red and blue. In Kyoto, the Kyoto Tower, a significant landmark in the ancient capital of Japan was colored by two-tones. In Kanazawa, Oyama Shrine established in 1599 which was dedicated to Toshiie Maeda, the founding lord of the Kaga Province was also colored by two-tones. In Ehime, the Matsuyama Castle which is one of the most beautiful original castles built on a hill was turned into blue and Matsuyama's famous Ferries wheel, "Kururin" was turned into red. Local newspapers and magazines published interviews concerning hypertension with itsrelevance as a cardiovascular risk factor.
